Be Water Wise Miami will engage students from 14 selected schools in analyzing water use at home and at school through a series of interdisciplinary activities and lessons. Through this initiative, students and community members will develop an increased awareness of the need to conserve this precious resource and they will gain the knowledge and tools needed to improve water conservation in their community, saving water and money.

To participate, students submit photographs of changes in the local environment and write a scientific explanation of the change they have observed. EstuaryLive is an annual, free, live and interactive field trip through our nation's estuaries. Participants have an opportunity to submit questions directly to field trip leaders during the broadcast, many of which are answered live. This year's program will feature six 30-minute segments broadcasting live from three of NOAA's National Estuarine Research Reserves, including a discussion of the impacts of global climate change on our coastal ecosystems. EPA Water Quality Video Contest - Entry deadline: April 22, 2009

The U.S. EPA Office of Wetlands, Oceans and Watersheds video contest engages the public on water quality issues and inspires stewardship of the nation's waters. Videos are being accepted on a wide variety of topics and should convey easy, low-cost ways to improve and protect the nation's waters. One winner will be chosen for a short, 30- or 60-second video that is usable as a public service announcement, and another will be chosen for a longer one- to three-minute video. Each winner will receive a \$2,500 cash award. The videos will be featured on EPA's website. [Learn more](#)

A&WMA High School Essay Contest - Entry deadline: April 22, 2009

The Air & Waste Management Association's (A&WMA) 2009 High School Essay Contest, "Driving Environmental Progress: What Can Students Do?" gives students in grades 9-12 the chance to share their thoughts on environmental issues and to win prizes. To participate, students write essays describing the role that young people can play in driving environmental progress. The first place winner will receive \$400 and may have a portion of his or her essay published in A&WMA's monthly magazine. All entrants will receive certificates of participation. [Learn more](#)

Student Essay Contest: Win A Hybrid School Bus - Entry deadline: April 30, 2009

IC Bus is offering a free hybrid school bus to the winning school in a student essay contest on "green" practices at school. In addition, the winning student will receive a \$5,000 scholarship and the faculty sponsor gets \$3,000 for educational materials. K-12 students are invited to submit 500-word essays describing their school's efforts to "go green." Essays will be judged on demonstration of commitment to environmentally conscious practices, demonstration of commitment to environmentally friendly transportation and creativity. [Learn more](#)

RBC Water Stewardship Projects

The RBC Blue Water Project™ was established to help foster a culture of water stewardship around the world. This year the project will provide \$100,000 for water stewardship projects in U.S. schools. TogetherGreen Fellowships - Application deadline: April 15, 2009

Help lead the conservation actions needed to shape a greener, healthier future. Apply to become a TogetherGreen Fellow. Each year, 40 new Fellows will get broad-based training, assistance and opportunities to help them conduct their own innovative, results-oriented conservation projects, serve as conservation role models, inspire and engage diverse audiences and communities, build leadership skills and connect with other U.S. and international conservation leaders. Applicants may be budding volunteer leaders or mid-career environmental professionals. They must have a passion for conservation, the desire to learn and grow and a commitment to making a difference. Chesapeake Classrooms

Chesapeake Bay Foundation's Chesapeake Classrooms focuses on methods to incorporate environmental education into the core subject areas of reading, math, science and social studies. Educators can earn graduate or recertification credits by participating in five-day immersion courses held throughout the summer. Additional application skills and recertification credits can be earned by attending our workshop series during the school year. Summer 2009 courses include Islands in the Bay and Explorations of Captain John Smith.
